

SALUTATIONS FROM SHAWN

A Better Hope

Wherever we turn these days, to television, podcasts or social media, it seems we hear another voice telling us they offer the best hope for the future. They alone can provide all the answers we need, all the solutions to our problems.

We have a better hope. As the Book of Hebrews tells us with beautiful imagery, Jesus the Christ is the exalted Son of God, the one whose sacrifice has saved us from sin and death. The God who spoke to our ancestors through prophets is the same God who spoke through Christ, whose constancy and faithfulness does not change, giving us true hope.

As God's Son, Jesus Christ is the Alpha and Omega, who remains the same from beginning to end. Due to his righteousness, Christ has atoned for the sins of other human beings, making us at-one with God, giving himself as the final sacrifice needed to bridge the gap between God and people.

Other people want to widen the gap. They encourage us to focus on differences, to doubt or even hate others. They tell us the world is a scary place where only they can be trusted. Jesus prayed that all people would be one, as he and God are one. (John 17:21) Hebrews 7:18-19 reads, "Moses' law made nothing perfect. But now a better hope has been given to us, and through this hope we can come near to God."

Our better hope is in Jesus Christ, who is faithful and true, who came to save all rather than a few, who calls us to unity through the Spirit. "Since we have a great priest over the house of God, let us hold fast to the confession of our hope without fearing, for he who promised is faithful. And let us consider how to provoke one another to love and good deeds, not neglecting to meet together, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day approaching." (Hebrews 10:21-25) God's work in Jesus Christ frees us to live by faith, knowing God's plans are to give us a good future with hope. (Jeremiah 29:11)

STEWARDSHIP

Why Should We Give? Financial Giving Puts God First

Putting God first helps us set other priorities. From beginning to end, the Bible says our financial giving pattern illustrates our willingness (or unwillingness) to give ourselves wholeheartedly to God's guidance in all our life.

In our culture, money represents us. We exchange time, intelligence, abilities, and energy for the money we receive. How we use that money reveals what we believe is important in life. Financial giving is an essential element in helping us form, retain, and grow in our spiritual connection with God.

Genesis 4:3-5 records the Bible's first mention of offerings to God. Abel gives first fruits to God, thinking of God before himself, and is rewarded with a close relationship with God.

Exodus 22:29-30 illustrates some of the earliest religious rules God gave through Moses. God requires the Israelites to put God first by giving first offerings from their harvest, and from their wine and oil presses. They are also to give their firstborn animal stock for sacrifice and to feed the priests. And they are to dedicate their firstborn sons to God's service. Following the Law of Moses, gave people guidance for spiritual, community, and legal matters about daily living, worshiping God, and keeping a proper relationship with God.

Deuteronomy 15:19-20 reminds the Israelites to give to God the firstborn males of cattle and sheep, then adds they are to eat them in the Lord's presence at the place of worship. (Could this be the origin of church potlucks?)

Jesus taught that life centered in God brings meaning, purpose, and satisfaction. Our financial giving helps us find what is most important in life.
