



SALUTATIONS FROM SHAWN

The Best Hope

How is your hope?

We seem to be in a time of discouragement. It's hardly the first-time society has experienced this. The people of Israel were in despair in the time of Jesus. They looked to the past, thinking they could recreate the glory days of Moses. No one can go back in time. The author of Hebrews assures us we don't need to live in the past. "*Jesus is worthy of more glory than Moses just as the builder of a house has more honor than the house itself. Now Moses was faithful in all God's house as a servant, to testify to the things that would be spoken later. Christ, however, was faithful over God's house as a son, and we are his house if we hold firm the boldness and the pride inspired by hope." (Hebrews 3:5-6)*

Through Jesus, we can trust in "*the promise of the unchangeable character of God's purpose*," strongly encouraged to see hope in Jesus, "*the sure and steadfast anchor of the soul*." (Hebrews 6:17-19) Since Christ has come and died for us, we have a "better hope" than in the past with Moses, a future reality that is desirable and certain. Christ is our only hope for God's plan to be fulfilled, for us to draw near to God. (Hebrews 7:18-19)

The Letter to the Hebrews was written to a Christian community in crisis, people who were discouraged and hopeless, wondering if Jesus really was the Son of God, if he really offered life with God. Life was a struggle. They were tired. So, the author reminded them to look to Jesus, "*the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, who for the sake of the joy that was set before him endured the cross.*" (Hebrews 12:2)

Hope for the future is found with one another in worship. "*Since we have a great priest over the house of God, let us come near to God with a true heart in confident faith… Let us hold firmly to the hope that we have confessed, for we can trust God who has promised to be faithful. And let us consider how to provoke one another to love and good deeds, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day of the Lord approaching." (Hebrews 10:21-23)*

When the world seems a troubled place, very nearly ready to drown in darkness, we do not need to despair. Our hope is in Jesus who is our anchor of faith, the best hope for the world.

Hunger & Homelessness Awareness Week November 17-23

In the simplest terms, homelessness is caused by the lack of affordable housing and limited amount of housing assistance available to those who need it. High rent burdens, overcrowding and substandard housing force many people to become homeless but has also put a growing number of people at risk of becoming homeless. Almost 60,000 families are homeless on a given night in the United States, according to the National Alliance to End Homelessness. Homelessness is a devastating experience for families. It disrupts virtually every aspect of family life, damaging physical and emotional health, interfering with children's education and development, and frequently resulting in the separation of family members. Many Americans are living on the edge, forced to choose between basic necessities like purchasing food, paying rent, or going to the doctor.

37.2 million Americans live below the poverty level, including 1 in 6 children580,000 Americans are homeless on a typical night44 million Americans are at risk of suffering from hunger

How can we help? We can fight hunger by donating food and/or money to the Schuylkill Haven Council of Churches Food Pantry, PO Box 303, Schuylkill Haven, PA 17972. Donations can be given to Servants to All, 4 S. Center St., Pottsville, which offers services to help people find jobs, permanent homes, and medical care.

'Off-Plastics October'

Eliminating single-use plastic from our lives will help reduce litter, ease landfills, and reduce the use of petroleum for disposable products. It will reduce the volume of micro-pellets of plastic that are showing up in animals and humans. It will reduce the amount of chemicals from plastic manufacturing leaching into our air and water. The Environmental Justice Mission Team is encouraging you to take concrete steps to stop using single-use plastic for your meals and activities.

- Avoid single-use plastics: plastic straws, plates and cutlery make our lives easier but have a serious impact on the planet.
- Rethink your food storage: instead of using plastic baggies, plastic wrap and plastic storage containers, use jars or glass containers.
- Take a cloth bag when you go shopping.
- If you do use any plastics, put your plastic waste in the correct recycling container and in accordance with local recycling services.
- Buy "natural" fabrics like cotton, hemp and linen. A single wash of synthetic fabrics can release 700,000 microplastic bits into the water.
- DIY your cleaning products. Use a mixture of 1 part vinegar to 3 parts water as an all-purpose spray cleaner produce wash.
- Try natural beeswax coated cloth wraps instead of plastic cling film.
- Use compostable garbage bags which won't last 1000 years.
